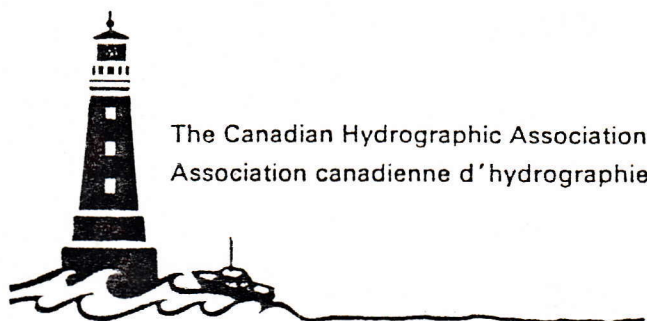
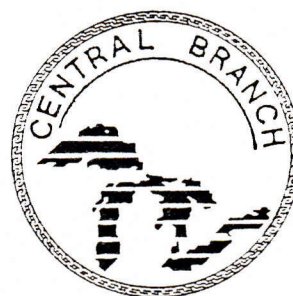

Report on 1988 Annual General Meeting of CHA held on 27 May 1988

The main purpose of the CHA annual meeting is for the membership to hear about the activities of each of the Branches and to receive the National President's report on his activities and his plans for the future.

Prairie Schooner Branch were not able to have a representative at the National Executive meeting or at the AGM this year, but all of the other Branches presented reports and financial statements.

The National President outlined the progress to date on incorporation ("we have dealt with the last few difficulties in the proposed by-laws and expect to be incorporated in the next few weeks"), the CIDA projects ("all set to go ahead") and our journal Lighthouse ("on track and going strong").

The Minutes will be distributed later, but this newsletter brings you the Central Branch report and Financial Statement that were given by Sam Weller.

Central Branch Report for 1987

This was a very good year in Central Branch, with an active program and several interesting events for our members.

One of our activities was to produce a series of newsletters to keep our members informed. We published five of these during the year, with such items as minutes of meetings, reports on Branch events, news of International members, news of our Branch members, news of other Branches, and discussion on items of interest to our members. (We also included the odd cute quotation or joke as a prize for reading through the rest of the stuff.)

Our seminar series with invited speakers continued in 1987 with luncheon seminars in a local restaurant, evening seminars combined with regular business meetings, and one working hours seminar.

- Dr. Mark Donelan spoke about Wave Studies in Lake Ontario,
- Gary Boyd spoke on bringing sight to remote villagers in the Andes,
- Brent Beale gave an overview of the CARIS II system as used by the CHS,
- Tom McCulloch told us about the Roots of the CHA in the 1960's,
- Dr. John Coakley spoke on Sediment Transport and the Hydrographer.

As well as three local executive meetings, our branch held six general meetings during the year. Three of these were at noon at CCIW where most of us work and three were in the evening at members' homes with an invited speaker as part of the seminar series. These evening events also feature beer and pizza and give us a good opportunity to get better acquainted.

In 1987 we again presented the H2O Bonspiel. This was the 17th Annual Bonspiel sponsored by Central Branch and it was a great success and a fun day. This year 47 curlers participated and thanks to our generous sponsors there were prizes for everyone.

Other functions we sponsored this year included a team of CHA Shipheads in the annual Burlington Road Race, a Wine & Cheese & Beer & Beef & Buns social evening, and a mid-summer Bring-Your-Own-Steak barbecue.

Our most demanding project, of course, was to host the Hydrographic Conference. This conference is a biennial event and in 1987 was in Burlington, sponsored jointly by the Central Branch of CHA and the Central and Arctic Region of CHS. Thanks to the work of Dennis St.Jacques and his committee the conference was an outstanding success.

All in all 1987 was a very good year. Central Branch membership increased from 47 to 73 paid-up members, and we managed to end the year in a healthy financial condition. And by continuing with an interesting program we hope to gain even more new members in 1988.

A program such as ours, however, is the work of a team, and on behalf of Central Branch members I would like to thank each of the people on our local Branch executive. Without you none of this would have happened. Thank you.

Conference News

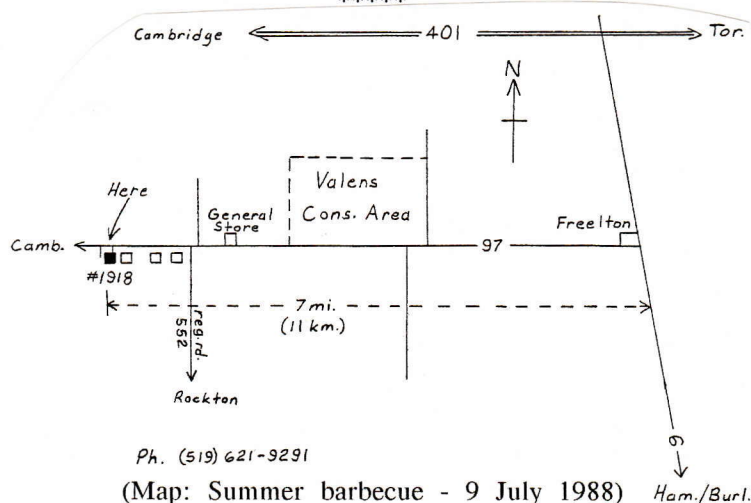
Captain Vancouver Branch of the CHA has produced a pamphlet with information about the Hydrographic Conference, March 6 to 10, 1989.

Julia Browning's Travels

Letters from Julie report that she has seen every road across northern Australia and it is HOT and HUMID. One night they camped by a billabong and went crocodile spotting. Quite put them off the idea of a swim in the river, she says.

For a few days they worked on a million-acre farm packing mangos. It was unbearably hot just standing in the shade, and cold showers ran hot water. They were in an area with temperatures around 40°C and "even driving with car windows open gives no relief. It's like having a hair dryer in your face all day." And road trains (trucks with 2 or 3 extra sections) go bombing by and push unwary drivers off the road. "No worries," she says, but avoid the road from Cairns to Charter Towers: not only is it always hot and humid but there are lots of dead boars, 'roos and other unrecognizable piles of rotting flesh on the roadside. You think skunks smell bad!

They were glad to reach Alice Springs and Ayers Rock where it was a bit cooler, and exploring the gorges at Katherine in rented canoes was a delight. Christmas was with friends in Melbourne, then on to Victoria and New South Wales. It was April when Julie finally managed to get to New Zealand with only a few weeks left before heading back to Canada. "We kept the best till last," she says.

The bottom line? "It has been a great year in the South Pacific, but now I need a job to pay bills!"
