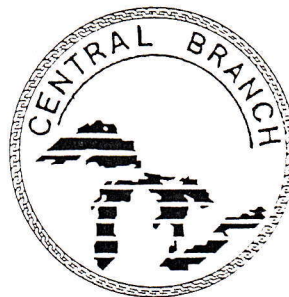

Notes from the Branch Vice-President

Last month I took this opportunity to reflect on the original objectives of our Heritage Launch Project, and this time I would like to do the same with the CHA organization. The objective is certainly not to build a boat; it is, however, to build knowledge.

When the CHA was founded in 1966, it was done for the purpose of guiding training programs for the civil service hydrographer. This does not pertain to today's needs but a similar role is realized. Information is dynamic; what one needs to know today will not be the same requirement tomorrow. The face of hydrography is changing fast; GPS, EC, RDBMS are no longer the property of R&D but are tools and products for the working hydrographer.

Knowledge through the availability of information is the resource to fuel personal development. Through our journal Lighthouse, in seminars and in workshops, the CHA endeavours to meet this goal.

Partnership is another of the movements afoot today, and the CHA is involved in this on a less tangible level. We have the involvement of our Sustaining Members – these companies support us in a big way – and each individual member can be thought of as a partner. In a less formal way there is the mutual respect and exchange of information between CHA and affiliated organizations such as the Hydrographic Society and the Canadian Institute of Geomatics, as they provide a source of information to promote professional development.

With all this said and done I will remind members of the upcoming Survey and Mapping Conference to be held in June in Toronto. At this conference there will be the CHA/GIAC Workshop on *Geomatics in the Marine Environment* as well as the CHA 1993 AGM. All good opportunities for members to get together and develop the personal contacts that can be as beneficial as the informational contacts.

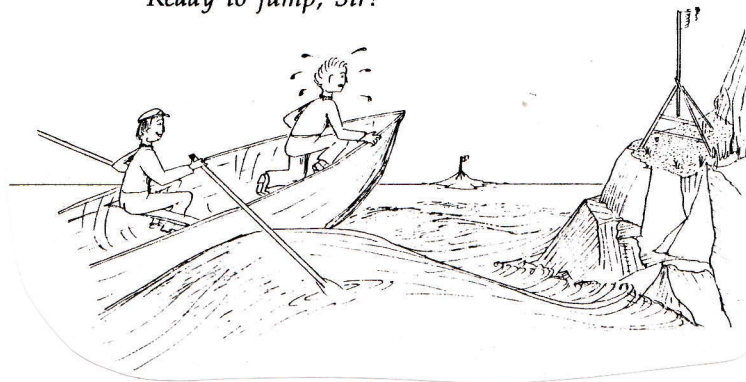

Minutes of General Meeting of CENTRAL BRANCH held on 21 April 1993

1) The meeting was hosted at Sam Weller's home: 4062 Lorraine Cr, Burlington. Sean called the meeting to order at 19:25, introduced everyone, and welcomed our visitors from Pacific and Ottawa Branches of CHA.

2) Minutes of the Mar. 10, 1993, General Meeting were available, and were circulated in the last newsletter.

3) In Terese's absence [still in the Arctic], Sam presented the Treasurer's Report to date.

Sean said the \$965. advance to the Conference was to purchase a supply of Admiral Ritchie's book. This is a fascinating and enjoyable read, and Admiral Ritchie has agreed to sign these for sale at the Conference.

4) Launch: Sean said the boat is nearing completion at Gill Bibby's boat shop and should be in the water in two or three weeks. The planking is finished and caulking is starting. The boat will be painted white with black gunwales. The sails are ready and are quite impressive. Official "launching" will be 11 June, the closing day, as a finale to the CHS/CIG Surveying and Mapping Conference, after being on display in the Conference Exhibit Hall. Our first official Toronto 200 [ie 200 Anniversary] appearance is Sunday 25 April at Fort York as part of their period presentation. Sean reminded us that it was always hydrographers who led the way in successful naval invasions; it would be appropriate for our launch – hydrographer in action – to lead the way in future naval re-enactments.

Keith said the Conference Committee sees our Launch as a big focus, & considering featuring it in other ways.

Sean said that completing the launch commercially is adding \$7,000. to the cost. Of the total anticipated cost of \$30,000. we have raised \$18K. We still need to find at least \$12K; more if we are to have maintenance funds to pass on with the launch later. All cheques gratefully received and earnestly solicited.

5) Conference Registration: Keith said that the Registration package has been mailed out, with a good response already. He is now seeking volunteers to staff the Registration Desk during the conference. The Heritage Launch will be a key focus of the Exhibit Hall. Perhaps the Registration Desk could be entirely in period costume??? Delegates will get a voucher for one Heritage Launch stein; others will be for sale, as will autographed copies of Admiral Ritchie's book.

6) Seminar Committee: Brian said for our next meeting we are invited to join the Company of Master Mariners in the Wardroom of HMCS York [Toronto] on Tuesday 18 May. Their Social Time begins at 17:00, followed by a speaker at 18:00 and a short business meeting. All are welcome. We'll arrange a car pool from CCIW. The CHA AGM will be on 9 June during the Conference, as will the Directors' Meeting (8 June).

7) Membership: Paola said our paid-up membership now stands at 67: 36 In-house, 11 Out-house, 2 Student, 18 International. Six Sustaining Members have signed on with Central Branch for 1993: Atlas Electronic of America, EG&G Marine Instruments, Racal Positioning Systems, and Simrad Mesotech Systems have renewed. Our warm thanks to each of you for your continuing support. We also welcome C-Map/USA of Sandwich, Mass, and SeaBeam Instruments Inc. of E. Walpole, Mass, USA, as Sustaining Members. Welcome aboard!

8) Correspondence: Sean had copies of an interesting article: Canada Steamships Ltd has signed a contract with Offshore Systems Int [Vancouver] to equip 11 ships with electronic chart equipment... which means a big push by CHS to create 90 electronic chart files.

Geomatics Workshop

On 8 June, CHA and Geomatics Industry Association of Canada co-sponsor a one-day workshop on *Geomatics in the Marine Environment*. This event is a lead-in to the CHS/CIG 1993 Conference at Royal York Hotel, Toronto. Morning presentations include experience with GIS, Larsen Lidar, an Optical Cable system project, and the influence of technology trends.

Afternoon demonstrations of marine applications include the Hygro-92 Ground Truthing Experiment, by Ocean Mapping Group, U of New Brunswick; Electronic Navigation Chart Data, by Eastcan Group of Survey Consultants; Electronic Chart Pilot Project, by Offshore Systems Ltd., and an open forum on the Future of Geomatics in the Marine Environment.

Cost is \$133.75 [inc. GST]. Attendance is limited to 50.
