

International Column

We are pleased to welcome Gary Chisholm of New Zealand to our International Column as Guest Columnist this month. Thanks, Gary, for writing.

One fine spring morning I woke to the news of the Canadian elections – the Progressive-Conservative party Government went from 170 seats down to 2. The new Government was voted in by a massive swing.

By the time I was in the shower I wondered if there was a parallel in hydrography? My 'mandate' would be to see all hydrographers electing DGPS (ie. those yellow boxes) as their positioning system. I can safely say that those companies involved in offshore survey work are buying only DGPS systems today. Many navies of the world are planning for, or have, DGPS. BUT those involved in dredging ports and harbours are still hesitant on DGPS and hold tightly to range/ range and range/bearing systems. Give them a few more years...

Another chance I get to meet my 'mandate' is to get the kids at University. About 20% of graduates from the School of Surveying here in New Zealand get employment in hydrography. Hydrography is the most popular course in the School. Each year I lecture on the theory (and error budget) of DGPS. That's easy to convince them about DGPS.

However, some 'parties' cannot be trusted with their DGPS advertising claims. What's new? I think every company now claims 'sub-metre' DGPS accuracy – but read the small print & ask around; some aren't correct.

On a personal side, my team of surveyors have been busy in Croatia, Pakistan and Bangladesh installing DGPS/HYDRO systems. We get all the good jobs! However we have been making use of some good Canadian HF radio link technology. HF, or satellite links, are good for remote sites but my vote is for the use of RTCM modulated onto radio navigation beacons. These reference stations are being set up by Governments in USA and Europe, and in your neighbourhood! The RTCM message is free, widespread across water and land, but not available in NZ!
