

After enjoying a delicious roast beef buffet dinner, members and guests were addressed by Mr. Philip Blackford M. Ed., who is the Executive Director of the Canadian Outward Bound Wilderness School.

Established in 1941, Outward Bound is a non-profit organization and a world leader in the field of experiential education or "learning by doing". The wilderness is Outward Bound's classroom; rocks, rivers, forests and lakes are the teaching tools. The mission of the Outward Bound Wilderness School is to promote self-reliance, care and respect for others, responsibility for the community, and concern for the environment.

Through video presentations and audience participation, Mr. Blackford clearly defined the spirit of Outward Bound. He also shared with us the aims and achievements of the various Outward Bound programs at home and abroad, with special mention of programs designed for groups of people with special needs.

As an aside, it was interesting to note that two of us had participated in Outward Bound courses in years gone by; Geoff Meek at the Mountain School in Wales, and Sam Weller at the Moray Sea School in Scotland.

After his talk, we presented Mr. Blackford with a cheque to the Outward Bound organization in memory of Gerry Wade, and as a personal token of our appreciation for his visit with us we also presented him with an autographed copy of Admiral Ritchie's book "An Hydrographer's Tale", suitably inscribed to commemorate the occasion.
