LIGHTHOUSE

It has been a busy year for Lighthouse with Edition 56 currently under construction and due to go to press in January. Members are encouraged to contribute items of either a general or technical nature for publication.

HERITAGE LAUNCH

Admiralty Launch *Surveyor*, a 23 foot sprit'sl schooner rigged launch, took part at a number of events this past season. The year began at Toronto International Boat Show in January where the launch helped attract a lot of media attention for *Hamilton Ship's Company of 1812*. In April, a group of dedicated volunteers helped sand, scrape, oil and paint *Surveyor*'s hull & spars in preparation for the summer. The first major event was Hamilton's Aquafest in July where *Surveyor* and crew sailed in the company of ships like *HMS Bounty* and brigantine *Saint Lawrence II*. Two fund raisers helped raise money for the launch's maintenance, a draw for a limited edition print and a summer BBQ organized by Jackie Miles at Canada Centre for Inland Waters.

The launch went indoors for the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, where she was part of the Ocean's exhibit. At Chatham, Ont, in October the naval encampment was united under one galley tent. Our chief cook Susan Needham prepared a superb meal with staples provided by our host at Heritage Days. Under oars alone, ship's boats from the Hamilton and Detroit projects, John Dixon's Swampscot Dory and *Surveyor* engaged one another and a fleet of Voyager canoes on River Thames. *Surveyor*, a 1788 reproduction also known as Bounty's launch, is owned by Canadian War Museum and operated by CHA, Central Branch, out of Burlington, Ont. Many thanks to those who volunteered time & efforts to help make 1997 an eventful season.

SEMINARS

Central Branch held five seminar meetings in 1997.

- Mr. Ted Cowan, an Economist with DFO, spoke at the first meeting on Jan 21. He addressed the decline of fish stocks since 1960's, the positive effect of Canada's Exclusive Economic Zone on preserving fish stocks and his involvement with the moratorium on the Cod Fishery.
- On March 12, Mr. Vic Cairns of the Dept of Fisheries and Oceans, Fish Habitat Studies, presented us with an informative slide show outlining the progress and achievements of their involvement in the Hamilton Harbour Remedial Action Plan. This program has effectively contributed to the revival of the shoreline and aquatic ecosystems in Cootes Paradise and Hamilton Harbour. Fish stocks, water clarity and quality in these waters have improved considerably.

- At the meeting on April 24, a video of the 1994 film *Icebreaker to the North Pole* was presented. The film is a documentary on the first surface vessel crossing of the North Pole, undertaken by U.S. Coast Guard Icebreaker *Polar Sea* in company with Canadian Coast Guard *Louis St. Laurent*. Scientific teams from Canada and the U.S. took part, and the various disciplines of their work in the Arctic are well covered.

- October 1, Mr. Ken McMillan gave an informal presentation on his involvement with hydrographic training and in business in Malaysia. A video entitled *Alone in the Dark*, a documentary on the lighthouses and lightkeepers of Georgian Bay, was also viewed.

- On November 6, Mr. Leslie Sike, a professional yachtsman who has spent years sailing in Arctic Waters, presented a half hour video showing excerpts from his expedition under sail to Hudson Bay. This was followed by an intriguing discussion.

GERALD E. WADE ESSAY AWARD

The award has expanded to include students enrolled in Survey, Geography & Marine Navigation programs at any Canadian colleges or universities. The program got off to a late start this year and calls are still underway. A total of 25 institutions will be contacted and each will receive an information package containing a follow-up letter and an information sheet to be posted. Submission deadline has been extended to Mar 10, 1998.

6) Correspondence: (T. Herron) Terese gave credit to Larry Robbins & Sam Weller for keeping in touch with international members. Other correspondence included subscriptions & back issues to Lighthouse and requests for technical information. Lately, students refer to the Branch for information for research and innovative technologies such as airborne bathymetry systems.

7) Special Presentation: Terese presented Earl Brown, one of the original founding members of CHA, with a Life Membership certificate. Earl was an early National President of CHA and was Vice-President of this Branch for two terms, and has been a strong supporter of the Branch since its inception over 25 years ago.

CARRIED

The evening's speaker was Capt. Leslie Sike, co-winner of the *Cruising World Medal* for outstanding seamanship, earned for their sub-Arctic sailing expedition across Hudson Bay in 1985. In the spring of 1989, with wife Carolann and crew, his yacht *Aqua Star* embarked on a 5,000 mile journey which took them through the icebergs, fog and pack-ice of the North Atlantic to one of Russia's most historic cities, Leningrad. Their timing couldn't have been better for these were the days of *Perestroika*. Their's was the first Canadian sailing vessel to sail into Leningrad and leave St. Petersburg. CHA Central Branch was very pleased to have Leslie present the story to us.
