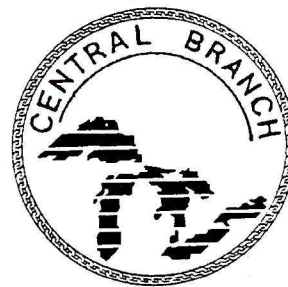

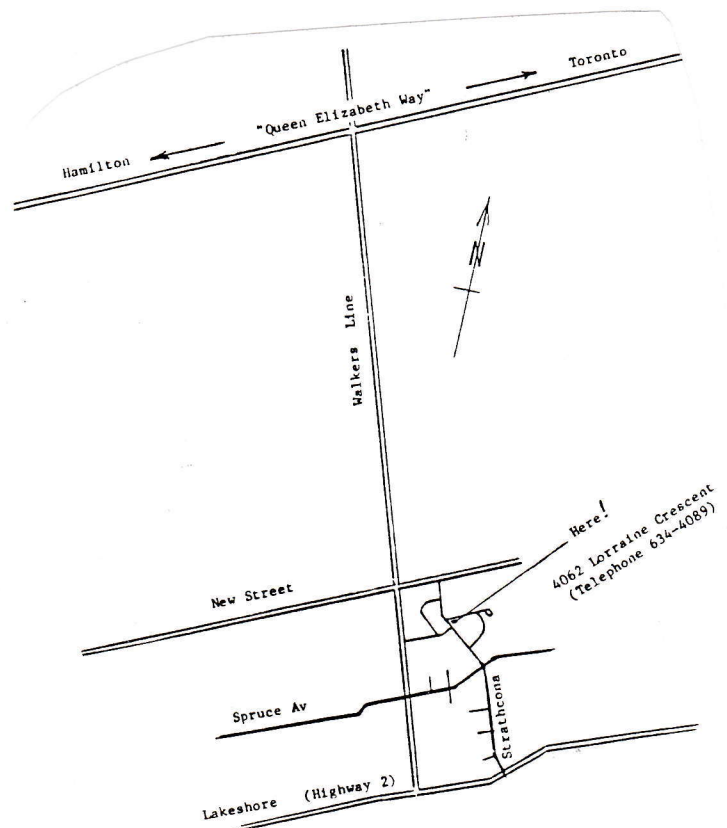

2) The minutes of the 11 December 1997 Annual General Meeting were circulated in the December newsletter and were available at the meeting.

3) Treasurer's Report: (A. Leyzack) Andrew tabled the proposed 1998 budget for review, stating that it was not significantly different from the budget for 1997. He also stated that a GPS raffle and other fund-raisers, to be discussed at a later date, are being considered, in order to generate revenue. He has prepared the 1997 year end statement and is currently seeking someone to volunteer his or her services in auditing it. One final item was that the Royal Bank money wire account has been closed, this service is replaced by the Canadian Institute of Geomatics (CIG) Mastercard. This should not result in any significant change in expenditures, as the cost of maintaining this service is minimal and the volume of transactions in a year is low.

5) Committee Reports:

Terese reported that there has been no drive for dues as yet, but membership is expected to remain roughly the same as last year, with no new members so far.

Wade Essay Award: Ed Lewis has agreed to chair this committee.

Lighthouse: (T. Herron) Terese conveyed that Lighthouse is slightly behind schedule due to recent computer networking problems and waiting for articles.

Social Events: (J. Miles/B. Powers) Brian reported that the preparations for the H2O Bonspiel are going well, and it is scheduled for Saturday February 28<sup>th</sup>. Andrew relayed that there was some carry-over in donation money from last year due to donations received late.

Admiralty Launch Surveyor: (A. Leyzack) Andrew reported that *Surveyor* has repaid its debt to the Branch and is \$500 dollars in the black. There has been much interest about the launch expressed by representatives of various re-enactment events and there is no shortage of potential events to participate in this year. As it stands, the launch and hardy crew are tentatively considering five events:

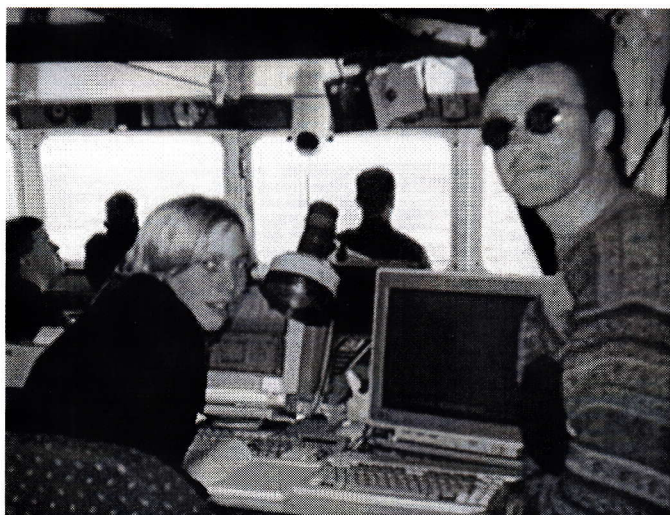


The International Column

There has recently been some interaction between New Zealand members of CHA. In Christchurch, Larry Robbins was able to meet with Gary Chisholm and was treated to a quick look at Trimble NZ's facilities. Gary describes the RNZN as the company's largest corporate customer and said he was 'thrilled' that the ship's programme had allowed time for a visit.'

Dunedin-based Peter Knight managed to get time away from his end-of-term work at the University of Otago to spend a couple of weeks at sea in MONOWAI. Larry is blaming Peter for the atrocious weather they experienced throughout Peter's visit!

The Pacific is experiencing an El Nino weather pattern at the moment. This is associated in NZ with extremely strong westerly winds and droughts on the east coast. Needless to say, MONOWAI's current survey is on the west coast of Stewart island (a large island off the southern coast of South Island) which is exposed to the west! As there is nothing between the survey ground and the West Island (aka Australia) the swells get rather large at times.

Peter says that it is interesting to compare methodologies and has noted a number of differences to what he has always considered to be 'the way' to survey. One case in point is that in the RNZN, one starts as bowman (crew) of the sounding boat, eventually works to watchkeeping the computer system, and then to coxswain the boat. Senior ratings and officers are the boat's officer (the surveyor) who controls the operation. This seems to be almost the reverse of CHS methods. Another case was in being allowed to observe the departure from Bluff Harbour from the bridge of MONOWAI, something he was not encouraged to do on CHS vessels.

Peter says he has noted that being both charge surveyor and captain of the ship, Larry has fewer arguments with himself than opposite numbers in the

CHS, though Larry says that this is only because Peter hasn't observed the debates!
