

3) Treasurer's Report: (A. Leyzack) Andrew presented the audited 1997 year-end Statements and said the Statement presented at the National Meeting and in the newsletter was not audited. Andrew said the Heritage Launch account had \$457, and next year all Launch items will be separate from the Branch accounts, as with Lighthouse. It was suggested our Branch's Professional Development Fund be advertised in the NewsLetter.

5) Committee Reports: Lighthouse: (F. Oliff) Fred said it may be possible to publish a May/June/July issue. Elizabeth Sinclair has now taken over the layout duties, though she would be more interested in being Editor, since Terese has given notice of giving up that post after this year. Lighthouse, therefore, is presently in need of an In-House volunteer to do the layout or be the Editor.

Keith raised the possibility of contracting an outside publisher, but Fred said budgetary constraints precluded this option. Brian suggested reducing costs by such means as using cheaper paper.

It was suggested that Lighthouse become a Canadian section in an international hydrographic journal, or perhaps part of CIG's *Geomatica*. Sam said Lighthouse was a key part of CHA's original Aims and it would be best to continue publishing it by CHA people for CHA people. Brian said we need a list of duties involved with Lighthouse and to consider training for volunteer staff.

6) Social Events: (B. Power) Brian voiced some concern that few CHA members participate in the H2O Bonspiel, and that if this doesn't change perhaps CHA sponsorship of this event should be re-evaluated.

7) Admiralty Launch Surveyor: (A. Leyzack) Andrew said it will be a busy season for *Surveyor*. [List of events and work parties is on page 3.] The launch is at Gill Bibby's boat shop. The new boat cover should be ready for the Ottawa trip. Volunteers are invited for our work parties. Hull does not need painting but does need anti-fouling; topsides need oiling. Cargo hammocks will go under each thwart for personal effects and life jackets. There will be a Launch meeting on 29th April at CCIW.

Admiralty Launch *Surveyor* – A Message from the Coxswain

On June 11, 1993, during the Survey and Mapping Conference at Toronto, a part of our surveying heritage was brought to life with the official launching of the 'Surveyor', which was a reproduction of a 1790's hydrographic launch. Thanks to the support of many dedicated individuals and our sponsors, the Heritage Launch Project became a reality and our main objective, a re-enactment of the first hydrographic survey of Toronto Harbour, was completed.

Three years later, in June of 1996, a memorandum of understanding was drawn up between the Canadian Hydrographic Association, Central Branch and the Canadian War Museum, which lead to the fulfillment of our second objective, the transfer of ownership of the 'Surveyor' to a public museum. Title to the launch was granted to the Canadian War Museum on December 1, 1996, with the understanding that CHA Central Branch manage and act as official custodian of the vessel. The Branch also agreed to operate the Launch for at least one Canadian War Museum sponsored event per year. In exchange, the Canadian War Museum agreed to provide adequate funding to maintain the vessel and insurance coverage for the Launch, her crew and guests.

Since her debut, the 'Surveyor' and crew have attended many public events, as far away as Louisbourg, Nova Scotia and Put-In-Bay, Ohio. She has also been filmed for documentaries and special events that have aired on public television. From "Operation Sail" engagements to indoor exhibits, the program is alive and well. When we gave up charity status, the name "Heritage Launch Project" ceased to exist and a new name "the Admiralty Launch 'Surveyor'" was created. *Surveyor's* homeport is still in Burlington, at Canada Centre for Inland Waters.

The 1998 sailing schedule will be as follows:

May 16-18th: The Festival of Spring, Ottawa, Ontario. Sounding the way for the flotilla down the Rideau Canal. There will be an encampment at HMCS Cormorant on Dows Lake.

May 26-29th: John Cabot's ship *Matthew* visits Hamilton. This will be a static display for local school groups to be held on the lawn of the Royal Hamilton Yacht Club with Cabot's medieval ship alongside.

June-TBA: A "Launch" lunch-time BBQ fundraiser at Canada Centre for Inland Waters, Burlington.

July 10th: Opening ceremonies at the Pier, Toronto's new Marine Museum, Toronto, Ontario. This will feature a hydrographic demonstration and presentation of Joseph Bouchette's 1792 harbour chart to the Mayor of Toronto.

July 11-12th: Celebrating the International Year of the Ocean, Sarnia, Ontario. This will feature a hydrographic demonstration on the St. Clair River.

Aug. 1-3rd: Simcoe Day Weekend, Toronto, Ontario. This will be an overnight encampment with hydrographic demonstrations and sailing on the harbour.

Aug. 21-23rd: The Battle of Georgian Bay, at Penetanguishene, Ontario. This will include an 1812 Naval Landing at Discovery Harbour, which was Captain Bayfield's base of operations during the 1820's surveys of Georgian Bay.

Oct. 3-4th: Faire at the Forks, Chatham, Ontario. An 1812 Naval Engagement and Grand Encampment by the banks of the river Thames.

We encourage you to come out and visit us; you're always welcome aboard.
